I. TYPE AND PURPOSE OF ACTION

Levi Ostberg, lessee of state lease #4976, has requested to place a new center pivot on Section 36, T22N, R2W. This area was previously irrigated by flood irrigation. The new lessee plans to place the new center pivot on the tract in order to irrigate the land this crop year in a more efficient manner. The project will consist of placing a new pump in the existing irrigation ditch, installing a new electrical service, placement of a new cement pivot pad, and installation of a new center pivot.

II. PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

DNRC is not aware of any other agencies with jurisdiction or other permits needed to complete this project.

Alternative A (No Action) –Deny the proponent permission to install the new center pivot.

Alternative B (the Proposed action) – Grant the proponent permission to install the new center pivot.

The soil types are primarily made up of silty sites. These soil types are gently rolling topography. Minimal impacts to the soil will occur in placing a new pump in the existing irrigation ditch, installing a new electrical service, placement of a new cement pivot pad, and installation of a new center pivot. Cumulative impacts on soil resources are not expected from the proposed project.

5. WATER QUALITY, QUANTITY AND DISTRIBUTION:

There are irrigation water shares with the Greenfield Irrigation District that allow for irrigation on this tract. Other water quality and/or quantity issues will not be impacted by the proposed action.

6. AIR QUALITY:

No cumulative effects to air quality are anticipated.

Vegetation will not be impacted as the tract is used for small grain production and is currently in stubble. Noxious and annual weeds within the proposed project area are not a concern as chemicals used in small grain production will control them. Cumulative impacts on the vegetative resources are not expected. The project will improve the productivity on the tract by providing irrigation water.

A review of Natural Heritage data through the NRIS was conducted and there were no plant species of concern noted or potential species of concern noted on the NRIS survey.

8. TERRESTRIAL, AVIAN AND AQUATIC LIFE AND HABITATS:

Consider substantial habitat values and use of the area by wildlife, birds or fish. Identify cumulative effects to fish and wildlife.

The area is not considered critical wildlife habitat. However, this tract provides habitat for a variety of big game species (mule deer, whitetail deer, pronghorn antelope), predators (coyote, fox, badger), upland game birds (sharp tail grouse, Hungarian partridge), other non-game mammals, raptors and various songbirds. The proposal does not include any land use change which would yield changes to the wildlife habitat. The proposed action will not impact wildlife forage, cover, or traveling corridors. Nor will this action change the juxtaposition of wildlife forage, water, or hiding and thermal cover. Wildlife usage is expected to return to "normal" (pre-action usage) following the completion of the project. The proposed project will increase plant vigor which will provide a greater food source for wildlife.

9. UNIQUE, ENDANGERED, FRAGILE OR LIMITED ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES:

Consider any federally listed threatened or endangered species or habitat identified in the project area. Determine effects to wetlands. Consider Sensitive Species or Species of special concern. Identify cumulative effects to these species and their habitat.

There are no threatened or endangered species, sensitive habitat types, or other species of special concern associated with the proposed tract.

A review of Natural Heritage data through the NRIS was conducted for T22N, R2W. There were zero animal species of concern, zero potential species of concern, and zero special status species noted on the NRIS survey

10. HISTORICAL AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES:

Patrick Rennie, DNRC archaeologist, was contacted and he stated that due to the tract being farmed, no historical, archaeological, or paleontological resources would be present.

Since the field is currently in tame/native pasture or agricultural land and the surrounding tracts are all either agricultural land or tame/native pasture, the project will not affect the aesthetics of the area.

The demand on environmental resources such as land, water, air, or energy will not be affected by the proposed action. The proposed action will not consume resources that are limited in the area. There are no other projects in the area that will affect the proposed project.
