
Why?CDs voted to use Standard Code (Sturgis) in 1987

Helps us stay focused

Alleviates confusion

Allows us to share proceedings with the public

Protects rule of majority and rights of minority



Making a Motion - the Basics

Make the motion

Second the motion

Discuss the motion

Vote - Majority Vote



Say, "I move..." and be specific I move we provide a scholarship for one local student to attend Youth Range Camp.

Keep discussion relevant to the current motion

Do NOT make negative motions I move we do not provide a scholarship for Youth Range Camp



Say, "I move..." and be specific

Keep discussion relevant to the current motion

Do NOT make negative motions
I move we do not provide a scholarship for Youth Range
Camp

Instead...

- Make positive motion and fail it
- Don't make the motion at all

*Note: Voting to *deny* something is still a positive motion, because you are voting to take the action of denying. However, it may still be easier to just make the motion to *approve* and then fail it.



Tabling vs. Postponing

Tabling a Motion I move to table this motion...

- In Sturgis, kills a motion
- Not debatable

Normally requires 2/3 vote, but for CDs, requires only a majority



Tabling vs. Postponing

Postponing a Motion I move to postpone this motion until...

Bring up discussion of motion at later time

Can be postponed to later in same meeting or a future meeting

Without a specific time, brought up under unfinished business



Tabling vs. Postponing

Postponing a Motion I move to postpone this motion until...

...after we hear from our guest speaker.

...the next board meeting in May.

...we hear the committee's report.



Small Boards

Discussion can happen before an official motion is made

No limits on debate

Chair can debate and vote



Special Rules for CD Boards

Majority of the entire board is required to conduct any business

All motions require a majority vote to pass

Majority of the entire board, not just the supervisors present required to pass a motion



Special Rules for CD Boards

Example:

- ► A CD board is comprised of 7 supervisors.
- Only 5 supervisors attended the March meeting.
- How many supervisors needed to vote in favor of a motion at the March meeting to pass it?
