Build America Buy America (BABA) Funding Agency Coordination: USDA Rural Development, DEQ SRF, Community Development Block Grants

What is BABA?

Construction projects that are funded with federal grants issued after May 14, 2022 must comply with Build America, Buy America requirements (unless a national waiver applies). The following products and materials must be purchased domestically:

- Iron and Steel
 - Same as AIS
- Manufactured Products
 - Cost of components that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the U.S. is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product
- Construction Materials
 - Non-ferrous metals, plastic and polymer-based products (including PVC, composite building materials, and polymers used in fiber optic cables), glass (including optic glass), lumber, drywall

RD, SRF, and CDBG all receive and use federal grants to fund their programs.

❖ **SUMMARY:** All products/materials in a construction project for drinking water and wastewater systems must meet BABA with the exception of cement and cementitious materials, aggregates such as stone, sand, gravel, and aggregate binding agents/additives.

BABA Product Waivers

- **Types of product-specific waivers**
 - **Nonavailability waiver**
 - Not produced in the United States in sufficient and reasonably available quantities or of a satisfactory quality
 - **Public interest waiver**
 - Applying the domestic content procurement preference would be inconsistent with the public interest
 - **Cost waiver**
 - Applying the domestic content procurement preference will increase the cost of the overall project by more than 25 percent


NOTE: If you think you need a product waiver, apply for it as early as possible. Federal agency waiver review times can be extensive.

Applying for a BABA Product Waiver

- Borrower/grant recipient applies for waiver by providing supporting documentation to the funding agency (RD, SRF, CDBG)
- Supporting documentation includes:
 - Brief summary of the project,
 - Description/explanation of the need for the waiver,
 - Brief summary of the due diligence conducted in search of domestic alternatives,
 - Quantity and materials of the product(s) in question,
 - Engineering specifications and project design considerations regarding product,
 - Unit cost of items (both foreign and domestic) in addition to an estimated cost of the materials and overall project,
 - Date any products will be needed on site in order to avoid significant project schedule disruptions, and
 - Any other pertinent information
- Funding agency reviews waiver to ensure completeness and submits to respective federal agency for review
 - Public notice (15 days)
 - Made In America Office review
- Keep in mind, each federal agency may have some variations to this process but required information is generally the same

Work with your funding agency on the waiver process.

Waiver Process Example



BABA National Waivers

- **SRF**
 - **Adjustment Period Waiver – “Documented” projects prior to May 14, 2022**
 - **Small Project/Award Threshold Waiver - <\$250,000**
 - **De Minimis Waiver – 5% total project cost**
- **RD**
 - **Projects on or before February 3, 2023**
 - **Small Project/Award Threshold Waiver - <\$250,000**
 - **De Minimis Waiver – 5% total project cost**
- **CDBG**
 - **Funds obligated before November 14, 2022**
 - **Small Project/Award Threshold Waiver - <\$250,000**

Note for SRF and RD:
If BABA waiver, AIS
still applies

Co-funded Projects

- **Cognizant Agency**
 - Federal funder with the most dollars in the project
- **National waiver coordination**
 - If the cognizant agency has a national BABA waiver, will the other federal agencies follow their waivers (or lack thereof)?

Federal Funder	Follow Cognizant Agency National Waiver(s) or Lack Thereof?
EPA (SRF)	Yes
USDA (RD)	Yes
HUD (CDBG)	Yes
DOI (BOR)	No
USACE (WRDA)	Yes (for now)

- **Product-specific waivers for individual projects**
 - Go to Cognizant Agency for review and processing
- **National product waivers**
 - Products that are not made domestically or have well-established domestic sourcing challenges (e.g., SS nuts and bolts waiver under AIS)
 - TBD and hopefully apply to all federal agencies

2023 = CHANGE

The Montana Legislature established the Renewable Resource Grant and Loan Program (RRGL) to fund the conservation, management, development and preservation of Montana's renewable resources. The RRGL program provides both grant and loan funding for public facility and other renewable resource projects.

Conserve

- To promote the efficient or sustainable use of a resource.

Manage

- To Improve the ability to control or administer a resource.

Develop

- To develop a new beneficial and sustainable use of a resource.

Preserve


- To protect a resource from pollution, destruction, or neglect.



PROJECT ELIGIBILITY

Grants or loans may fund the following project types:

- (a) Feasibility, design, research, and resource assessment studies;
- (b) Preparation of construction, rehabilitation, or production plans; and
- (c) Construction, rehabilitation, production, education, or other implementation efforts.







Loans

- Since 1987, INTERCAP has been a valuable, low interest loan resource for over 550 Montana governments.
 - Water, Sewer and Solid Waste Districts
 - Irrigation Districts
 - Counties
 - Cities and Towns
 - Rural and Special Improvement Districts
 - Street Maintenance Districts
 - State Agencies and Universities
 - School and Fire Districts
 - Tribes
 - Other Governmental Entities

We finance

- Preliminary engineering and grant writing work
- Interim financing for construction
- Water, wastewater, solid waste, and irrigation district revenue bonds for construction or equipment
- New and used vehicles
- New and used equipment
- Energy retrofit projects
- Real property purchases and improvements

Program Basics

- Low-interest loan program
- Variable interest rate
 - New rates are effective every February 16
 - Average rate over the last 15 years: 2.24%
 - Current rate: 5.75% (6.00% existing, no autopay)
- Loan term is either
 - Statutory limit,
 - Fifteen years, OR
 - Useful life of project, whichever is less

Team Montana

- Since 2022:
 - Annual bond issue/remarketing cost paid by borrower Loan Rate ELIMINATED
 - Bond used to fund the INTERCAP loans interest is now paid to Montana's Short-Term Investment Pool (STIP) participants
- Bond and Loan Rate reset every February
- Bond Rate to STIP participants is based on mid-point 1-year Treasury on February 14 plus 0.10%
- Borrower Loan Rate is Bond Rate plus up to 1.50% for program operating
- This year's 5.75% Loan Rate (5.069% Bond Rate to STIP + 0.681% program operating spread)
 - Additional 0.25% handling fee will be added for 6% total loan rate to process existing loans not set up for autopay.

Short-Term Investment Pool (STIP)

- Created by the Legislature in 1973 as an investment vehicle to manage state and local government cash. A safe, convenient option to invest and withdraw cash with 24-hour notice.
- A STIP reserve account is maintained that may be used to offset realized gains or losses. Additionally, the reserve will be available to limit fluctuations in the net asset value (NAV), to the extent deemed prudent by staff.

Straightforward Application

- No match required
- No upfront fees
- No prepayment penalty
- No application deadline
 - Reviewed on first come-first served basis
 - Typically takes 4-8 weeks from application to funding
 - Staff approves loans up to \$1 million
 - Available online www.investmentmt.com/INTERCAP

Loan Servicing

- INTERCAP Application
 - A short fillable form the Borrower can submit securely online.
- INTERCAP Loan Servicing
 - Since 2022, MBOI directly manages all phases of the loan servicing previously contracted by indenture of trust to a private bank.
 - **Autopay is required for new loans.** Borrowers with existing loans currently submitting check or initiating ach/wire to make payments will receive a **0.25% reduction on the 6% loan rate to 5.75% by switching to autopay.**
- No Vehicle/Equipment Liens required



INTERCAP

Since 1987, INTERCAP has been a valuable, low interest loan resource for eligible Montana government units as defined under 17-5-1604, MCA. The INTERCAP program is a variable rate loan program, where interest rates are adjusted on February 16th of each year. Eligible projects have wide flexibility, e.g. new and used equipment and vehicles, real property improvements, cash flow, preliminary engineering costs, and grant writing.




DWSRF – Lead Service Lines (LSL)

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) allocated \$15B for LSL efforts

- MT can receive up to ~\$140M: \$28M/year over 5 years.
- Funding will be dispersed through State Revolving Fund Process.
- Have to complete a Project Priority Survey Form to be eligible for the Loan/Loan Forgiveness
- Loan/Loan Forgiveness Program (no match, 1.5% rate).
- If a system qualifies for forgiveness, they are eligible for up to 60% forgiveness up to a maximum of \$2 million
- Technical Assistance Set Aside managed by Dept of Commerce

DWSRF – Emerging Contaminants

Emerging contaminants (ECs) are chemicals or materials characterized by a perceived, potential, or real threat to human health or the environment or by a lack of published health standards. A contaminant also may be "emerging" because of the discovery of a new source or a new pathway to humans. Emerging Contaminants can be found in pharmaceuticals, fragrances, fire retardants, detergents, insecticides, and industrial chemicals. ECs that Montana will be focusing on are PFOA/PFOS and Manganese.

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) allocated \$15B for LSL efforts

- MT can receive up to ~\$37M: \$7.5M/year over 5 years.
- Funding will be dispersed through State Revolving Fund Process.
- Have to complete a Project Priority Survey Form to be eligible
- 100% Loan Forgiveness
- Project has to be primarily for addressing Emerging Contaminant

ECs for Small or Disadvantaged Communities

- MT has been allocated a total of \$18.9 million for FFY22 and FFY23.
- Grant program with no match requirement.
- Have to complete a Project Priority Survey Form to be eligible
- Eligibility
 - Project has to be primarily for addressing Emerging Contaminant
 - Small System defined as serving less than 10,000 customers
 - Public and Private Community Water Systems and non-profit non community non transient water systems

Eligible Projects for ECs

Eligible Projects include:


- Emerging contaminants costs associated with the construction of a new treatment facility or upgrade to an existing treatment facility that addresses emerging contaminants.
- Development of a new source (i.e., new/replacement well or intake for a public water system) that addresses an emerging contaminant issue [Note: water rights purchases must still meet the criteria in the Class Deviation for Water Rights].
- Consolidation with another water system that does not have emerging contaminants present or has removal capability.
- Costs for planning and design and associated pre-project costs.
- Infrastructure related to pilot testing for treatment alternatives.
- Creation of a new community water system to address unsafe drinking water provided by individual (i.e., privately-owned) wells or surface water sources.


