I. DESCRIPTION OF ACTION

Triple derrick drilling rig to drill a single SWD well, 10,585' MD/5,495' TVD.

II. PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

A. PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT, AGENCIES, GROUPS, OR INDIVIDUALS CONTACTED

B. ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED

No Action Alternative: Permit to drill the well would not be issued by BOGC.

Action Alternative: Referred to the BOGC for further environmental review.

III. IMPACTS ON THE PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT

A. AIR QUALITY

Long drilling time: No, 5-10 days.

Unusually deep drilling (high horsepower rig): No

Emission sources: Vehicles traveling on county road to location, combustion engines on location during drilling operations. Fugitive dust from traveling operations and location during active drilling.

Possible H₂S gas production: Potentially in Mississippian formations.

In/near Class I air quality area: No.

Air quality permit for flaring/venting (if productive): No, this is a disposal well.

Comments: No special concerns – Triple derrick drilling rig to drill a single SWD well to 10,585' MD/5,495' TVD.

B. WATER QUALITY

Salt/oil-based mud: Steel surface casing hole will be drilled with freshwater and freshwater mud system to 1920', Rule 36.22.1001. Will drill with oil-based invert drilling fluids for the intermediate casing hole. Horizontal hole will be drilled with saltwater.

High water table: No.

Surface drainage leads to live water: Ephemeral drainage Snake Creek is approximately 0.61 miles northwest of the location. Snake Creek has a confluence with the perennial Shotgun Creek approximately 1.41 miles west.

Water well contamination: There are four water wells within a ½ miles radius. There is a domestic and stockwater well approximately 1683' north with a total depth of 49' and a static water level of 35'. There is an irrigation well approximately 2007' northwest with a total depth of 49' and a static water level of 20'. There is a domestic well approximately 2084' northwest with a total depth of 35'. There is a stockwater well approximately 2132' northeast with a total depth of 36'. The surface hole will be drilled with freshwater and freshwater mud to 1920' and steel surface casing will be run and cemented back to the surface to protect groundwater.

Porous/permeable soils: No, silty clay loam.

Class I stream drainage: None.

Groundwater vulnerability area: No.

Mitigation:

Lined reserve pit

Adequate surface casing

Berms/dykes, re-routed drainage

Closed mud system

Off-site disposal of solids/liquids (in approved facility)

Comments: Steel surface casing will be run to 1920' and cemented back to surface to protect freshwater zones (Fox Hills aquifer) in adjacent water wells, Rule 36.22.1001. Adequate surface casing and BOP equipment to prevent problems, (5,000 psi annular and double ram), Rule 36.22.1014.

C. SOILS/VEGETATION/LAND USE

Vegetation: Cultivated farmland.

Stream crossing: None anticipated.

Erosion potential: High, cut of up to 25.6' and fill of up to 12.2'.

Loss of soil productivity: No, location will be restored after drilling if unproductive.

Unusually large wellsite (Describe dimensions): A well site of 570' X 505' required for a five-well pad.

Damage to improvements: Slight, to cultivated farmland.

Conflict with existing land use/values: Slight.

Mitigation:

- Avoid improvements (topographic tolerance)
- Exception location requested
- Stockpile topsoil
- Stream Crossing Permit (other agency review)
- Reclaim unused part of wellsite if productive
- Special construction methods to enhance reclamation

Access road: Access will be from a +/- 282' proposed access road from Road 1009.

Drilling fluids/solids: Hydra Services, LLC will not be utilizing a drilling pit. Drilling fluids and solids will be transported to a state approved disposal facility.

D. HEALTH HAZARDS/NOISE

Proximity to public facilities/residences: There are no occupied structures within a ¼ mile radius. The closest occupied structure is approximately 0.35 miles north in SWSW Section 4 T28N R58E.

Possibility of H2S: Possibility in Mississippian formations.

Size of rig/length of drilling time: 5-10 days.

Mitigation:

- Proper BOP equipment
- Topographic sound barriers
- H2S contingency and/or evacuation plan
- Special equipment/procedures requirements
- Other:

E. WILDLIFE/RECREATION

Sage Grouse: No.

Proximity to sensitive wildlife areas (DFWP identified): None.

Proximity to recreation sites: None.

Creation of new access to wildlife habitat: No.

Conflict with game range/refuge management: No.

Threatened or endangered species within 5 miles: Chestnut-collared Longspur, Baird's Sparrow, LeConte's Sparrow, Nelson's Sparrow, Loggerhead Shrike, Bobolink, Whooping Crane, Sedge Wren, Long-eared Myotis, Silver-haired Bat, Northern Hoary Bat, Eastern Red Bat, Little Brown Myotis, and Northern Pearl Dace.

Mitigation:

- Avoidance (topographic tolerance/exception)
- Other agency review (DFWP, federal agencies, DNRC Trust Lands)
- Screening/fencing of pits, drillsite
- Other:

Comments: Cultivated farmland. There may be species of concern that may be impacted by this wellsite. We ask the operator to consult with the surface owner as to what he would like done if a species of concern is discovered at this location. The Board of Oil & Gas has no jurisdiction over private surface lands. No concerns.
